The 2025 legislation session concluded with several important bills reaching the governor's desk. Many of these bills will have an immediate impact on our neighborhoods. Below are some notable bills awaiting the governor's signature:

Homeless Triage & Treatment: HB 943 establishes a Homeless Triage and Treatment Center Program within its Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division. It will serve homeless individuals and individuals at-risk of homelessness with substance abuse issues or mental illness.

Condominium Loan Program: SB 1044 establishes the Condominium Loan Program and the Condominium Loan Revolving Fund. These programs seek to provide financing to condominium associations for essential repairs and deferred maintenance.

Fireworks: SB 222 extends the sunset date for the Illegal Fireworks Task Force from 2025 to 2030. The Task Force has been effective in removing over 200,000 pounds of illegal fireworks from our streets. Extending the sunset date is crucial to maintain this momentum and ensure the long-term effectiveness of the Task Force's mission. HB 806 appropriates funds to the Department of Law Enforcement to conduct fireworks

sting operations and establish an explosives firearms laboratory for forensic and evidence testing. HB 1483 increases criminal penalties for illegal fireworks use and if another person suffers substantial or serious bodily injury.

Mopeds: SB 30 prohibits people under the age of sixteen from driving a moped and requires all people driving a moped to wear a helmet. SB 1216 requires safety check inspections to ensure that a vehicle or moped is not equipped with a noisy muffler or exhaust system. The bill also increases the maximum fines for violating the noisy muffler law, among other provisions.

Free School Meals: SB 1300 expands free school meal coverage to students who currently qualify for reducedprice lunch. This ensures that all school children in families dealing with food insecurity have access to free meals.

Electric Vehicle Batteries: HB 242 establishes a working group to examine how to maximize the recycling and reuse of electric vehicle batteries. The working group would also recommend best practices to manage hazardous waste from these batteries as the use of electric batteries increases in the future.

# **MOVING FORWARD**

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Surfing: HB 133 appropriates money to the Department of Education to support the establishment of surfing as a statewide interscholastic sport. Hawai'i is the birthplace of surfing and is popular with residents and tourists. This bill expands athletic opportunities and recognizes the cultural traditions of Hawai'i.

Homeless Youth: HB 613 authorizes the Office of Youth Services to contract with nonprofit organizations to provide shelters for homeless youth or young adults. Support services like this can help young people break the cycle of homelessness by improving well-being and helping young people become productive and self-sufficient members of the community.

# **REAL ID REQUIRED ON MAY 7, 2025**

Beginning on May 7, 2025, only federal compliant REAL ID driver's licenses and state ID cards will be accepted to get on domestic airlines flights and to enter certain federal buildings and military bases. A United States Passport or military ID can be used as an alternate identification.

When acquiring or renewing a driver's license or state ID card, residents must indicate on the application whether the card will be federal compliant REAL ID. There is no additional fee for the star marking.

To obtain a REAL ID, you can make an appointment at <u>alohaq.honolulu.gov</u> or go to the nearest Driver Licensing Center anytime between **7:45am to 4pm**:

## **NEW GREEN BIN RULES**

There are new green bin rules in Honolulu! Effective April 25th, residents can place the following items into the green bins:

- Food waste (all food scraps including meat and dairy)
- Compostable items (such as certain takeout containers, coffee pods, and paper bags)

What stays the same? All of the following items can continue to be placed in green bins:

- Yard Trimmings
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves
- Natural Christmas Trees

What can't go in?

- Plastic Bags
- Metal
- Glass
- Styrofoam
- Non-compostable Packaging
